Answer to Thursday's Trivia

Tom Paciorek holds the distinction of having played in the last major league regular-season game played by Julian Javier and in the first major league game played by Julian's son, Stan Javier. Julian last appeared in a major league game Oct. 1, 1972 as a member of the Cincinnati Reds. Paciorek played first base and right field for the Reds' opponents, the Los Angeles Dodgers. When Stan made his major league debut April 15, 1984 with the Yankees, Paciorek was at first base for the White Sox.

Strike Chronology

Chronology of events leading to baseball strike
Nov. 14, 1984 Negotiations begin for a new contract.
Dec. 31 Old contract expires. Sides remain far apart on such issues as salary arbitration, free agency, pensions and television revenues.
March 12, 1985 Owners claim staggering financial losses, including \$2 billion in 1984, and say losses will worsen.
March 31 Separate season agreement expires. Players have asked continuation of normal playing hours' essential contribution to one-third of their national TV revenues—\$60 million a year.
April 4 Owners and players agree to expand to seven TV game slots for additional \$1 million in TV revenues but players want more. Money is to be cut elsewhere until all contracts are renewed.
May 15 The executive board of the Players Association sets a strike date at approximately 4:30 p.m. Eastern Standard Time.
May 17 Owners announce mandatory drug testing for all non-major league baseball personnel. Ask major leagues to voluntarily accept testing as a condition of playing in 1986. Project \$66 million in losses by 1990.
May 20 Owners refuse financial offers downward and want claim \$2.5 billion loss in 1986. Project \$66 million in losses by 1990.
May 23 Owners make \$25 million player offer but it is a \$12 million personal offer plus \$13 million for their pension contribution. Players call plan "Crazy."
May 27 For first time Owners and players negotiations. Saying he represents the fans, the commissioner asks negotiators to consider proposals by completed from their unions, agents and consultants and his ideas.
May 29 Players and owners return to bargaining table after two days of talks, but progress is made. Salary arbitration expires and the bargaining table reopens.
May 31 Owners propose to reduce pension demands, but will not budge on salary arbitration. He proposes.
June 1 Players give owners specifics of their pension compromise but to remain associated on issue of salary arbitration. Dan Fehr, head of the players' union, says players will stick to deadline and strike at the completion of games on Aug. 8. Both sides are possible a settlement can be reached before then.
June 4 Owners go on strike and games are cancelled. Talks continue.

Guides edge past Braves, 2-1

With major league ballparks idle for the first day Tuesday because of a players strike, action continued in the minor leagues.

At Old Orchard Beach, Maine, the Guides scored two controversial runs in the sixth inning Tuesday night to defeat the first-place Richmond Braves, 2-1, in an International League game.

Starter Keith Creel, 6-4, scattered nine hits over seven innings, and reliever Jeff Barkley allowed one hit over the last two innings for his 10th save. Steve Shields, 3-5, went all the way for the Braves, giving up six hits.

The Guides broke a scoreless tie in the sixth. Jim Wilson led off with a double down the right field line, which right fielder Lee Graham dropped after an attempted diving catch. Wilson advanced to third on a groundout and scored on a disputed call at the plate.

Butch Benton hit a grounder down the third base line that was fielded cleanly by third baseman Steve Curry. His throw to catcher Larry Owen beat Wilson to the plate, but umpire Mike Holoka ruled Wilson slid under Owen's tag. Owen was ejected after a lengthy argument.

With one out and Benton on first, Shields was called for a balk, touching off another major argument. Jim Weaver sliced a double to right center for Maine's final run.

Elsewhere in the IL, Rochester downed Columbus 3-1. Tidewater swept Pawtucket 4-2 and 3-2, and Toledo outslugged Syracuse 12-9.
